CAMPAIGN 'GUARANTEE OUR ESSENTIALS'

The basic rate of Universal Credit should at least cover the cost of essentials like food, household bills and travel costs, but it is not set according to any objective assessment of what people need.

Trussell Trust have launched the Guarantee our Essentials campaign to lobby for change.

By guaranteeing essentials 9 in 10 low-income households on Universal Credit will be able to manage.

Bridging this gap would help to alleviate the need for Food Banks.

NANTWICH FOODBANK -10 YEAR ANNIVERSARY



The foodbank hosted its 10-year anniversary at The Crown in Nantwich. The event was hosted by the Ceris Esplen.

The event began by recognising the 52 active volunteers who give an amazing 4702 hours every year to the foodbank.

Ceris ran through a brief 10-year history of the Nantwich foodbank:

- 2012 Nantwich foodbank is born under Churches together in Nantwich.
- Part of Trussell Trust national network of foodbanks.
- Financially supported by local housing association in the wake of Welfare Reforms and impact on customers.
- Partner referral network established and drop-in collections begin at Market Street Church.
- Volunteers increase and we are well supported by the local church and school networks.
- 2014 Became a registered charity and employed first employee Jane Emery as Foodbank Manager.
- 2015 Tesco becomes Trussell Trust partners and donations/ collections begin.
- 2017 A bumper year for fundraising and a new signposting service launches to help to provide vital support.
- 2018 Emily Vaughen joins as Storeroom Manager, and Sainsburys Nantwich makes us their charity partner and regular collections begin.
- 2020 Moved to new delivery model and purchased a van, volunteers work tirelessly and selflessly to support those in need during Covid.
- 2021 We begin to include fresh food in our parcels and Damien Gear joins and the new Foodbank Manager when Jane joins Trussell Trust.
- 2022 Caroline Brown joins the team, and the board of trustees welcomes four new trustees.

Morrisons community champion (Nantwich)

I have been doing this job for 5 years since the start of covid and lockdown. A lot of people couldn't get out, so we started delivering food to them, basically doorstep deliveries for people who were vulnerable. This is how my role began. After lockdown we continued with a different service called click and collect, where vulnerable people unable to shop in-store could collect their food from us.



My job is to help everyone in the community, and I love it. My area covers Nantwich but all the way to Tarporley too, including schools and nursing homes. We help with things like raffles and summer fare, providing donations to help various causes.

We support the Nantwich RSPCA with cat food bins, and Paw Prints to Freedom, a dog rescue charity.

We assist the Nantwich foodbank with foodbank drives. We have Foodbank pick up packs in store. People can pick up these items and pay for them at the till and they get donated to the foodbank. The other day we raised £500 for the foodbank which was match funded by the rotary club taking the total up to £1000.

I have a group of nutty knitters that knit things to sell in store that raise money for various charities. The knitting group started at the beginning of covid, making scrubs for the NHS, and then got bigger and bigger to form the 'Nutty Knitters'.













One of their amazing winter knitting projects is called 'Winter Warmer packs'. They produce 100 packs per year that go out to the elderly in Nantwich and the surrounding rural community who are struggling with fuel poverty. The packs include a knee blanket, gloves, a scarf, hat, chocolates, and a Christmas card. The cards are made by school children in Nantwich. The winter warmer packs are wrapped in Christmas paper and are giving to doctor's surgeries who give them out to those in need.

We are also involved in the foodbank reverse advent calendar campaign and have a toy donation station in-store. People buy toys from the store or bring things in from outside and we give them to the Foodbank to give out to children in the community.

There is so much that we do and to share but that's all for now. See you in store.
